A. Recording data and r ecording it consistently

Information not recorded: Some of he information hat wild be most will for excluding programs is never ecoded. This includes information about he socioeconomic test paticipant and information aboutheir beance about and phycal ormental health is . Examples of information hat might not be ecoded in a count file for a program paticipant wild be his by of beance about or mental health problems and patassement and teament information.

Information only in paper files, and not consistent: Often, information aboutance aba and phical ormenal healh iss isecoded onlyin paperfiles Thos paper files may or may not be acceived hogh one of he ciminal isce agencies Reteing infomation from paperfilesist me-conming atbes and made difficitby m of noesmade byindiidalsko maybe he facthathe data are often in he fo ecoding he patcipant pr oblems ing nique persectes hohand any of desibing information, or two may eco d only patal infomation. Missing information in electronic sources: Information hat is in heogracoded in an electronic database maybe mixing much of h e ime.
